MCPS Staff Gift Policy: MCPS Staff Ethics Policy related to accepting gifts: Gifts to staff are not expected nor solicited, however we recognize and appreciate the desire to celebrate our staff for their dedication and hard work. Occasionally, staff members will receive gifts from parents during the holiday season, at the end of the year, or for special occasions such as a wedding shower, a baby shower, etc. Please be aware of the ethics policy as you consider your recognition over the holidays and beyond. As a friendly reminder (or possibly new information for those new to the Montgomery County Public School System), the MCPS Ethics Policy states that staff may not accept gifts from parents/families exceeding \$20 in value or a series of gifts exceeding \$100 in value in a calendar year from any person or family. If parents/families decide to contribute to a class gift for the staff member, it must follow the MCPS policy and each parent/family contribution to the gift cannot exceed \$20 in value. For example, if 15 families contribute \$10 each to make the class gift value of \$150 or 10 families contribute \$20 each to make the class gift value \$200, then this will be in accordance with the MCPS gift policy.

Outstanding DES Obligations: This is a friendly reminder that all obligations should be cleared on or before Friday, June 16. These obligations include, but are not limited to, the following items:

- Library books
- Cafeteria charges
- textbook replacement charges.
- Chromebooks and chargers.

We want all students to remain eligible for the end of year events. Thank you in advance for your cooperation!

STEP 1: Determine Eligibility

Children age 5 by September 1 on the first day of school are eligible for enrollment.

Age and Attendance Requirements

Contact International Admissions and Enrollment at 240-740-4500 to begin the enrollment process when:

• The student is age 7 or older by September 1 and has not attended school within the U.S. or a U.S. accredited school (i.e., Department of Defense school or an accredited American International school in a foreign country) within the past two years, or

• The student does not live with a parent or legal guardian.

STEP 3: Important Documents

- Proof of Residency
- Identification
- Birth documents
- Health Forms

Parents registering their children for the first time in a Montgomery County public school must provide proof of county residency, identity, age and immunizations, unless homeless. Required immunizations must be completed within 20 days of registration.

Students who have previously attended school should bring their latest report card, if available. Students receiving special education services should bring a copy of the current Individualized Education Program (IEP).

School Volunteer Training Process:

As we begin to prepare for the upcoming school year, we are looking at opportunities next year for our grade levels to have regular school activities and events, including participating in field trips, This means we will have opportunities for volunteers for some of these school events. In order to permit school volunteers, we need to make sure all volunteers are properly trained and cleared before volunteering can begin in school. Currently, all volunteers/contractors must complete the vCAN (Volunteer Child Abuse/Neglect) module. In addition, depending on the level of volunteering, some are required to be fingerprinted, per the vCAN FAQ- https://www.montgomeryschoolsmd.org/uploadedFiles/childabuseandneglect/FY22%20CAN%20Volunteer%20FAQs_211129(1).pdf. Fingerprinting requirements are not being changed for field trip events where we travel to another state.

Diamond Elementary School and Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) values the volunteers who work in our schools to enrich our students' experiences. As a community, we all are mindful of our shared responsibility to create safe, nurturing environments for our students. In order to be a regular volunteer at Diamond Elementary School, all parents, guardians, and community members must complete the Diamond Elementary School Volunteer Training and MCPS Child Abuse and Neglect training. Here is more information on who needs to complete the required training.

• If MCPS records reflect that an individual completed MCPS training offered in the 2021-2022 school year, the individual does not have to undergo additional training for the 2023-2024 school year.

• Any volunteer who completed the online Recognizing Child Abuse and Neglect Training in the 2020-2021 school year or prior, will need to renew their training certification in 2023-2024 by completing the Diamond ES Volunteer Training and the MCPS Recognizing Child Abuse and Neglect Training.

The Diamond Elementary Volunteer training reviews school procedures and school expectations regarding volunteering in the school building. This online training takes about 5-10 minutes to complete. The Montgomery County Board of Education has revised its child abuse policy, and MCPS has engaged in a comprehensive effort to implement practices and protocols to ensure all of our students have a safe learning environment. MCPS has developed training for all volunteers in the district to learn about recognizing and reporting child abuse and neglect. All Diamond Elementary parents, guardians, and community members who wish to volunteer at Diamond Elementary School by helping in the classroom, media center, grade-level field trips, lunch and/or recess, <u>MUST COMPLETE</u> the two-step volunteer training process which includes the Diamond Elementary Volunteering Training and the MCPS Child Abuse and Neglect Training before volunteering can begin at the school.

More Information about the MCPS Child Abuse and Neglect Training

The online child abuse and neglect training provides information about:

- Types of abuse;
- Grooming behaviors that may make our children vulnerable; and
- The MCPS procedures and state law requirements for reporting suspected child abuse or neglect.

While we encourage all community members to engage in this important, informative training, currently we only require individuals who **regularly** support schools to complete the Child Abuse and Neglect training. Infrequent or occasional volunteers who support large events or assist at one-time events under the supervision of school staff members are not required to complete the training at this time.

Below are examples of the types of activities that do not require completion of the volunteer training:

- Guest readers and speakers in classrooms where they will be supervised by a MCPS employee;
- High school/college recruiters and volunteers at job and college fairs;
- Parents/guardians or other relatives who are observing or supporting a celebration (e.g., a parade) or helping with a class party; and
- Parents/guardians staffing concession and ticket booths at large events.

We have the option of using the online child abuse and neglect training module as a resource to provide individual or small group training sessions for their volunteers, especially if accommodations, such as language interpretation, are needed. The online training is available in Amharic, Chinese, French, Korean, Spanish, and Vietnamese. Parents/ guardians will not be barred from participation in their schools due to the need for accommodations.

Just a reminder, you must complete both the Diamond ES Volunteer Training and the MCPS Child Abuse and Neglect Volunteer Training before you begin volunteering at the school. If you have completed the training in the past 3 school years, you will need to redo the volunteer training this year since it has been more than 2 years. We are grateful for your commitment and partnership to ensure the safety of students. Your continued support will help to keep our school a safe and wonderful place of learning for all students.

Diamond Elementary Arts Program June Newsletter

What is going on in Music class during June?

Kindergarten students will sing within a limited vocal range and sing songs that use the voice in a variety of ways. Students will use pictures and/or symbols to represent long/short and high/low sounds. Students will produce appropriate sounds in response to picture symbols representing long/short and high/low sounds. Students will maintain the steady beat on instruments using locomotor and non-locomotor movements. Students will create movement and sounds appropriate to accompany dramatic poetry and fables.

1st grade students will be working on reading and notating simple rhythm and pitch patterns. Students will write or place notes in spaces and on lines. Students will match pitch within a limited vocal range for simple melodies and songs. Students will arrange and create sounds to ostinato patterns. Students will dramatize simple stories or poems.

2nd grade students will be working on notating the pentatonic scale as well as half notes, half rests and dotted half notes. Students will continue singing within a limited range. Students will identify various musical symbols to facilitate notating the music they hear or compose. Students will create simple speech or melodic ostinato to accompany songs. Students will learn dances from various cultures.

3rd grade students will notate simple rhythm patterns and read notation for pitch patterns.

Students will use the voice, recorder or body percussion to improvise phrases that answer given melodic phrases in the same style. Students will read melodic notation on the treble staff and play on the recorder or virtual instrument

4th grade students will conduct or group beats in music with meter in two, three or four. Students will read simple rhythm patterns using quarter notes/rest, eighth notes and sixteenth notes. Students will compose and notate simple rhythms using their shaker/scraper and found sounds to enhance a song, story or poem.

5th grade students will read and perform simple rounds/canons, songs with a descant or partner songs to create harmony. Students will read simple rhythm patterns using quarter notes/rest, eighth notes and sixteenth notes. Students will compose and notate a short ostinato rhythm pattern to enhance a song using their shaker/scraper and found sounds.

What is going on in Physical Education class during June?

K-2: By the end of June kindergarten through 2nd grade students will be able to identify how body systems and physical activity effect the body.

3-5: By the end of June 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade students will be able to explain the relationship between effort and improvement as well as design a realistic, achievable, and challenging short term physical activity goal.

What is going on in Art Class during June?

Kindergarten - Students will create ocean-themed art.

- Grade 1 Students will finish glazing their flower dishes.
- Grade 2 Students will explore weaving and craft wriggly creatures.
- Grade 3 Students will paint their pinch pot creatures.
- Grade 4 Students will finish glazing their coil pots.
- Grade 5 Students will complete their soft sculptures and reflect.
