Instructional Focus

Reading	MP2: Many of the Junior Great Books selections and Jacob's Ladder selections relate to the topic of study in science. Through these instructional resources, students continue to develop their close reading and analytical skills, and respond to text in writing. One of the extension lessons from Junior Great Books taps into the student's creative abilities in using what they learn about engineering design to design a surfboard. Students engage in reading and writing experiences with the highly motivating genre of fantasy. Students participate in literature circles; reading and studying fantasy picture books and novels, paying special attention to how authors create descriptive settings of fantastical worlds, magical characters, and believable events in preparation to write an original fantasy story.
Writing	MP2: Students begin The Research-Based Argument Essay where they blend informative and opinion writing to create three argument essays. Students work in research groups to learn about author's perspective and how to synthesize information across texts. The information is used to hold debates to build powerful argument essays. Students learn how to strengthen the elements of argument (i.e. claim, reasons, evidence) through counterclaims and rebuttals, and techniques to appeal to the audience.
	The last weeks of the unit engage students in reading and writing experiences with the highly motivating genre of fantasy. Students study fantasy picture books and novels, lifting elements of fantasy writing by published authors to write an original fantasy story.
Math	5th grade Module 1, place value and decimal fractions completed. 5th grade Module 2, multi-digit whole number and decimal operations: Students apply the patterns of the base ten system to mental strategies and the multiplication and division algorithms.
Compacted Math	5th grade Module 4 Multiplication of Fractions and Decimal Fractions completed. 5th grade Module 5, Geometry: Students apply understanding of multiplication and addition to find area and volume of shapes.
Social Studies	Analyze the historic events, documents, and practices that are the foundations of our political systems. Explain the significance of principles in the development of the Declaration of Independence, Articles of Confederation, Preamble, U.S. Constitution and the Bill of Rights.
Science	Students will learn about the structure and properties of matter.
Health	Students will focus on stress management.
