

8th Grade Assembly to End Overdoses

Do you know what Fentanyl is? Did you know that 106,000 people died from overdose in the year of 2021 in the United States? Did you know that a student from Quince Orchard High School nearly died on the floor of a McDonald's restroom because he overdosed?

On Tuesday, May 16th, 2023, there was an 8th grade assembly about Fentanyl and Opioid Overdose. Fentanyl is an opioid that is fifty times stronger than the traditional heroin.

There have been many deaths in Montgomery County related to overdose. We heard from two individuals who were directly affected by this epidemic and learned that drug overdoses have increased exponentially over the past few years. The speakers at the assembly made it clear that these cases not only affect the person who overdoses, but each person that they have encountered throughout their life.

Let's Look At The Numbers

According to the data collected by Montgomery County Public Schools, there have been 11 deaths and 37 hospitalizations related to opioid overdose within our county. This is a staggering, 78% increase from 2021.

Unfortunately many high schools in our county have been reporting higher numbers of overdose cases for quite some time. The main problem is that two out of five opioid pills are laced with fentanyl. There are many fake pills that have been laced with fentanyl, and put young lives at the risk of consuming a fatal drug.

Symptoms of Overdose:

- -Slow, shallow or stopped breathing
- -Sleepy and unable to talk, or unconscious
- -Blue lips or fingertips
- -Pale/Grayish skin
- -Loud snoring or gurgling sounds
- -Small constricted, pinpoint pupils
- -Limp body

How Can You Help?

The only cure against Opioid Overdoses is Naloxone, or more commonly known as Narcan. This reverses the effects of the Opioids and has been able to save thousands of lives. Majority of schools in MCPS have healthrooms and health-care professionals who know how to administer this medication.

If you suspect an overdose, call 911 immediately and wait for help. If you are worried about getting in trouble, keep in mind that the longer you wait, there won't be a life to save. Maryland has put into action The Good Samaritan Law, which is a law that will protect you from consequences in the case that someone needs medical attention from an alcohol or drug emergency.

If you are feeling depressed, are diagnosed with mental health disorders, or are having thoughts of suicide, talk to a trusted adult. Your parents, friends, teachers, counselors, everybody is here for you.

There have been so many exciting things going on in our school, especially in the Minority Scholars Program (MSP), sponsored by Ms. Bourdet and Ms. Nelson, and led by our amazing MSP officers, Hanna, Grace, Aditi and Nicole.

On March 18th, 2023, all of MCPS's MSP programs met at Northwest High School, to better celebrate the diversity we all represent at the 12th annual MSP Retreat! Thousands of students, all the way from Blair to Poolesville arrived to celebrate. Before we move forward, let's understand what the MSP is and what it stands for. The Minority Scholars Program is a program where students of minority groups come together to battle issues of racism and prejudice in our society. The day before the retreat, every attendee was given a T-Shirt to celebrate the 12th annual retreat of the MSP. The blue color was chosen, to showcase that we students are the blueprint for the future.

Inside the Northwest High School Auditorium, the stands were split up into sections to accommodate the many schools that would be taking part in the MSP Retreat.

At 9:15, the event started, followed by speeches of the people who made all of this possible, including the Superintendent of Frederick County. We then talked about the importance of MSP and how it started. Back in 2005, Walter B. Johnson High School, realized the amount of injustice done to students of minority groups in their

education. They noticed the subtle acts of racism, and they spoke up. They called for action, for a community to be made that would help to settle these injustices. That was when the MSP was born. 12 years ago, during the first MSP Retreat, there were only 50 students. Look at us today, when over 1000 people gathered to celebrate our diversity.

To recognize the majority of schools gathered there, a video was made to call roll. The noise was on a different level – worse than our grade-level lunches combined. When our school was shown, we screamed at the top of our lungs to symbolize where we were. Flashlights on, we waved our phones in the dark, representing LPMS proudly. Then, the thousands of students split into small groups to discuss four important topics - Racism, Anti-Racism, Unity in the Community and Restorative Justice. Racism, bias, and prejudice must be taken seriously by everybody.

Minority Scholars Program Retreat Continued

Though many of us here at Lakelands Park take the community circles and No Place for Hate Lessons as a joke, some people do care. In fact, many people care, judging by how many people participated in our workshops on March 18th.

It is important to make sure that we never use derogatory terms in a way that makes other people feel less than they are, and makes them feel self-conscious of their culture. It is our responsibility to make sure that the community we belong to welcomes everybody, regardless of race, religion, background, etc.

We were divided into groups, and in these classrooms, we had very insightful discussions about the impact of racism today, how it affects us, what anti-racism is and what the difference is, what restorative justice is and how we can implement it in our school, and what problems we can work on solving within our communities.

Small discussions were led by MSP students themselves, who helped to facilitate the conversation. Many students like to think of MSP as a safe -place. A place where they can express themselves freely and be who they are. We discussed the impacts of racism in our community, how we can implement restorative justice, what anti-racism is and how we can work together within our own communities to solve problems in our society.

For some of these activities, our own MSP officers acted as facilitators. These two officers were the only middle schoolers in the entire retreat who were asked to facilitate a workshop with 5th graders. Hats off to our amazing leaders Hanna and Grace! After the first two activities, the president of Poolesville's MSP described the challenges he faced by being African-American and having a stutter. How he never had the chance to find a community he belonged in, until the MSP.

Next, we experienced a beautiful fashion show, directed by Wootton HS. The mastermind behind it all, stated that she wanted the clothes to represent the anxiety and depression of the Coronavirus pandemic. We also witnessed some beautiful dance performances, including the Last Minute Crew - the Quince Orchard HS K-POP dance group that came to Lakelands Park a couple of weeks ago! Q: What advice would you give to your future self?


A: To stick with it and be resilient.

Talking to Our PE Teachers - Editorial Follow Up

Here at Lakelands Park we pride ourselves on constant inclusion and equality of all voices. In our last issue, we published a 7th grade Editorial called "Gloom in the Locker Room" which questioned the new locker room policies.

As many of you may recall, the article brought up concerns such as changing in the Stalls, PE Clothing and Shoes, and Timing. In accordance, we have come with a response from the PE teachers. Ms. Jenkins and Ms. Thom were able to share more information on behalf of the Physical Education Department. According to Ms. Jenkins, "while changing your clothes for PE is good for your hygiene and ability to participate if you are wearing restrictive clothing- it does not impact your grade if you choose not to. You are only required to have the proper footwear to participate."

She added, "If you would like to change your clothes I agree it can be a little uncomfortable at first, but to me, you wouldn't be exposing more of yourself than you possibly would at a pool if you are wearing certain undergarments." So, you aren't required to change clothing, but you have to change proper footwear. According to MCPS policy, "Shoes are to be worn at all times. Open toe shoes are not appropriate for PE, Science Laboratory settings, and Technology Education classes."

Next, was addressed changing in the stalls. "We understand changing in the stalls would offer more privacy, but that brings us to our next issue which is bathrooms. Students are encouraged to use the bathrooms while in the locker room before and after PE. If you know you have to use the restroom, then you can go before you leave the locker room or wait until you come back in. If students were using the stalls to change this would make it more difficult for students needing to use the restroom. We encourage bathroom use during locker room times because we are often outside which makes it difficult and time consuming to come all the way back in from the field and we are often playing games in larger group settings and it is difficult for teachers to keep track of who is coming and going and making sure everyone is accounted for," they said.

Finally, Timing. Ms. Jenkins said, "It is important to get to all of your classes on time and that is the expectation in PE as well. We know that our hallway is pretty far from certain places like the 3rd floor and the hallways can be crowded but the vast majority of students make it to class on time every day from every location in the school.






